1. Why are you running for office? **To provide an alternative voice for those fed up with the policies and campaign tactics of major parties and to speak for personal liberty.**
2. Name your top three endorsements/supporters. (No elaboration, please.)

TAX QUESTIONS

1. Missouri has the lowest state tax on tobacco in the nation. Given that fact, and the state's budget, should Missouri raise the cigarette tax? **No. I oppose any net tax increases. Cut spending by eliminating/merging departments, boards, regulations & programs.**
2. Do you have a plan to add to Missouri's revenue stream in 2011? **No. If we eliminate barriers to business formation and quit trying to pick winners with incentives, revenue will increase – but not immediately.**

3. Can you name a Mo. tax credit you would vote to end in 2011? **Yes All credits should be reviewed and eliminated unless they have provable benefits, not pie-in-the-sky overestimates. Start with film production incentives.**

4. Is it true that many Missouri tax credits do more to line the pockets of wealthy business owners than to provide jobs to Missourians. **No. Actually, they line the pockets of well-connected persons, whether or not they are wealthy or business owners. Limit or eliminate TIF, TDD, NID, etc.**

5. Did Jay Nixon act correctly to veto a measure that would have given a legislative committee authority over how to spend some ARRA funds? **No. Our elected representatives should have had a say in how this money was spent – or not spent!**

6. Is a flat sales tax better than continuing to rely on property taxes? **No. Towns with little retail activity would be hurt. I favor replacing the state income tax with consumption-based taxes - the Fair Tax.**

7. Do you favor Proposition A? **Yes. Income taxes are economic disincentives. Let's require all taxes over a minimal base to sunset, and require a vote to extend them.**

EDUCATION QUESTIONS

1. Is the legislature, in this economy, doing a good job for K-12? **NO. We need vouchers and a form of school choice to make schools compete to do better.**

2. Is the legislature, in this economy, doing a good job for higher ed? **Yes. About as good a job as can be expected right now. There is no extra money; colleges need to trim admin costs.**

3. Are all NCLB test benchmarks reasonable? **No. It punishes districts that need the most help. NCLB should be repealed and states set their own standards.**

ENERGY QUESTIONS

1. Does coal-to-energy threaten Missourians' water, air and health? **No. If we can't meet energy needs, our health would be threatened.**

2. Is Missouri doing enough to end coal-to-energy reliance? **No You can't legislate technology. The market will produce the products when the demand is there. Drop the irrational ideology and allow consumer choice.**

3. Should electric utilities have authority to charge present customers for future projects? **Yes. How else are they to reasonably finance long-term projects? Power plants (of any type) or improved distribution systems take years and money.**

SOCIAL QUESTIONS

1. Is Proposition B a threat to the rural economy? **Yes. It's misleading and funded by groups that oppose any kind of animal husbandry.**

2. Would you vote to end abortion in cases of rape and incest? **No. We have reasonable restrictions right now; we can reconsider if biological research and the Supreme Court provide reasons to change.**

3. Has the legislature done enough to make sure Johnson County families are better off now than they were two years ago? **No. It's not their job to make us better off by "doing things." They can make us better off by freeing us from useless restrictions.**
